### Jaguars grab Joeckel; Dolphins trade up to No. 3 for DE Jordan

The Miami Dolphins made a big move, trading up to the No. 3 spot in Thursday night's NFL Draft to get their guy.

The Jacksonville Jaguars just waited for the Kansas City Chiefs to pick.

The Jaguars selected offensive tackle Luke Joeckel with the No. 2 pick in the draft, helping to solidify an offensive line that allowed 50 sacks in 2012.

The Jaguars will pencil Joeckel in as the starter opposite left tackle Eugene Monroe.

The Dolphins then made their move, trading with the Raiders to get defensive end Dion Jordan from Oregon.

The 6-foot-6, 240-pound Jordan, who can play defensive end or outside linebacker, has drawn comparisons to former Dolphin Jason Taylor. Jordan had 14.5 sacks in 45 games with Oregon, and as a senior he had five sacks and forced three fumbles.

The New York Jets selected Alabama cornerback Dee Milliner with the pick they got from Tampa Bay in the Darelle Revis trade.

Florida defensive tackle Shariff Floyd had to wait a bit, but the Minnesota Vikings called his name with the 23rd pick.

#### STILL WAITING T'EO UNRAFTED

### Tackles lead the way as NFL teams look for brawn in first round

NEW YORK — NFL teams bought in bulk in Thursday night's draft.

Unlike the past few glam-and-glitter years when bumper crops of quarterbacks reigned, this was pure brawn: more than 600 pounds at the outset with offensive tackles Eric Fisher of Central Michigan and Luke Joeckel of Texas A&M.

The first seven picks were all linemen: four on offense, three on defense.

Not until Florida State's EJ Manuel went to Buffalo at No. 16 was a quarterback taken — the lowest since 2000, when Chad Pennington went 18th to the Jets.

Fisher became the first Mid-American Conference player selected at the top when Kansas City's new regime, led by coach Andy Reid, chose the 6-foot-7, 306-pound offensive tackle.

"This is so surreal," Fisher said. "I'm ready to get to work right now. I'm ready to start playing some football. I can't process what's going on right now."

## Brevard connects on four region wins

COCOA BEACH — Megan Kugelmann struck out 10 hitters and allowed just one bloop base hit as Cocoa Beach throttled Bishop Moore 10-0 in the Class 4A softball regional quarterfinals.

The Minutemen advanced to Tuesday's semifinal to again face Astronaut, a 13-0 winner at Lake Highland Prep.

"She's been pitching really great lately. She's given up just a few hits in the last several games. One-hitter tonight. She's looking strong going into Tuesday," said Cocoa Beach coach Wayne Moore.

Brevard County teams went 4-1 a night after starting 0-4 in the regional quarterfinals.

The Minutemen (22-5) scored one run each in the first and third innings before busting the game wide open with six in the fifth inning.

They ended the game with two more in the top of the sixth.

"We just had to adjust. We had to wait, and we had to stay on top of the ball," said Moore of his pitching.
